

## **Project History**




- 2010 Funding from BHRCA for Feasibility Study & Wayfinding Implementation Plan (FS/IP)

- 2011 Funding from BHRCA for Phase II – CEQA, CD's, and permits











Preliminary Trail Alignment shown and subject to further planning and coordination with stakeholders
























The purposes of CEQA are to:

- Inform decision-makers and public about potential significant environmental impacts
- Identify ways to avoid or reduce impacts through mitigation and/or alternatives
- Disclose the **reasons** why an agency approved a project, notwithstanding its environmental impacts

CEQA Guidelines Section 15002



- To provide the Lead Agency with information to use as the basis for deciding whether to prepare an environmental impact report (EIR) or a Negative Declaration;
- (2) To enable an applicant or Lead Agency to modify a project, mitigating adverse impacts before an EIR is prepared, thereby enabling the project to qualify for a Negative Declaration;
- (3) To assist in the preparation of an EIR, if one is required, by focusing the EIR on the effects determined to be significant, identifying the effects determined not to be significant, explaining the reasons for determining that potentially significant effects would not be significant, and identifying whether a program EIR, tiering, or another appropriate process can be used for analysis of the project's environmental effects;



- (4) To facilitate environmental assessment early in the design of a project;
- (5) To provide documentation of the factual **basis for the finding in a Negative Declaration** that a project will not have a significant effect on the environment;
- (6) To eliminate unnecessary EIRs; and
- (7) To determine whether a previously prepared EIR could be used with the project.

# **Mitigation Measures**

- California Sagebrush-California Buckwheat Scrub Restoration
- Protection of walnut trees
- Additional special status plant survey
- Migratory bird nesting survey/Raptor nesting survey
- Regulatory authorizations
- Archaeological monitoring
- Paleontological resource recovery
- Soil management practices
- Construction noise control



# CEQA REVIEW PROCESS

- With mitigation, all impacts would be less than significant
- Completed the Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration in January 2013
- Notice of Intent to adopt the MND was published and distributed on January 16, 2013 for a 30-day public review period
- Public meeting was held on January 30, 2013 to present the project and solicit comments.
- Comments were accepted until February 18, 2013

## **Revisions to IS/MND**

- Text changes to clarify or correct some information
- Add Section 1.4 to acknowledge comments received and include responses and comments into appendix
- Indicate BHRCA's intent to continue to work with property owners, residents, the oilfield operator, and the City of Culver City on Segment C
- State throughout the IS/MND that Segment C is a preliminary trail alignment and will be subject to future change/refinement and additional environmental analysis/review

These revisions do not change the analysis or conclusions of the IS/MND

- Discretionary Action on the project (approve/deny project, part of project, or modified project)
- Adoption of Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP)
- Filing of Notice of Determination (NOD)
- Meet with property owners, residents, Oilfield operator, and City of Culver City regarding Segment C
- Refine Segment C alignment and improvements
- Additional environmental analysis and review for Segment C
